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Rationale of the 5th International Conference of WAMU-NET

The 5th International Conference of the Global Network of Water Museums (WAMU-NET) aims to address the **historical and contemporary challenges of sustainable urban water management** with a view to promoting our unique water heritage. In addition to exploring the international dimension, the conference will focus on the water heritage of Porto and Portugal, highlighting relevant contributions to **water assets preservation, promotion, and education**.

Each WAMU-NET conference tackles a different theme and invite researchers, stakeholders, museum staff, and practitioners from around the world to share their experiences and learn from international experts in the field to enhance **water sustainability education**.

In Porto, the cultural heritage of water is represented by **Parque Patrimonial das Águas** (Waters Heritage Park), managed by the public water and energy supply company, **Águas e Energia do Porto**. Parque Patrimonial das Águas is an open-air museum of the territory that gathers all the water infrastructure of the city, registered on an online repository (Porto Water City), that aims to educate about the Porto's Water Heritage and its historical value ensuring accessibility and sustainability.

During the three-day conference, theoretical approaches will be combined with discussions, breakout rooms, and interactive sessions to exchange knowledge and stimulate new ideas and solutions for water heritage promotion and education. The contributions of WAMU-NET and its members to the **Phase 9 of IHP** and the theme of this year's WWD, 'Water for Peace and Prosperity', will be addressed. Specific sessions to present and discuss projects implemented by WAMU-NET and water museums for sharing experiences and networking opportunities are planned. WAMU-NET's online repository of educational resources will be also presented.

Water museums are a key vehicle for promoting **tangible and intangible water heritage along with natural and cultural diversity** and fostering education toward new generations. These institutions are engaged to explore and disseminate in new ways the history of water and its relations with humans, focusing on urban settings, ports, shipping, water management and other socially relevant practices.

Museums are a key platform for reflection and involvement of the large public in the technical, social, and cultural fields, addressing the complex daily functioning of urban water management and its sustainable impact on our increasingly fragile natural environment. From a contemporary perspective, museums are to be seen as providers of key insights to design new practices in a global context of critical challenges.



Mapping Urban Waters and Water Heritage Sites

Cities have grown historically around rivers: there are many notorious examples worldwide. Cities are the **everlasting reflection of human activities**, therefore a case of **perpetual transformation**. However, cities also are the materialization of the eternal conflict between **memory and oblivion**; as such, they have left in their process of constant change several significant 'overlapping layers' related to water management that are worth tracing, interpreting, and showcasing. This is exactly the role of water museums.

The 'cities of water' represent a key part of our cultural heritage: a paradigmatic **model of water civilization**. From a contemporary perspective, historical examples provide key insights to outline **new visions and new practices** in a global context of critical challenges.

Today the cities of water and their contemporary transformations are important to understand and overcome, in the eternal game between visible and invisible, the contradictions of a crucial public industrial service and the recognition and relevance of **water as an essential public good**.

The European **Port City Atlas** will be addressed during the conference, as well as the **Urban Heritage Atlas of UNESCO**, as they provide models and insights into living with water and can inspire future water management in a period that is challenging traditional water systems. Living on and with (fresh) water has created unique tangible and intangible heritage around the world. People have carefully designed **buildings and cities that are uniquely adapted to local water challenges**. Examples include not only notorious cities like Porto, Lisbon, Amsterdam or Venice, just to name a few, but also distinctive settlements on stilts (like Nzulezu, Ghana), floating towns (Zhouzhuang Water Town, China) or construction in the bayous of the Southern US. Similarly, tidal or seasonal changes have provoked special responses in architecture and design, think of tidal ports, such as on the Elbe River in Hamburg, or living with seasonal rivers as the Bou Regreg which separates Rabat and Salé, in Morocco. River cities are also closely related to **intangible values**, including religious beliefs, for example bathing in the Ganges, India, or sending a message of peace through floating lanterns on the Motoyasu River in Hiroshima, Japan.
